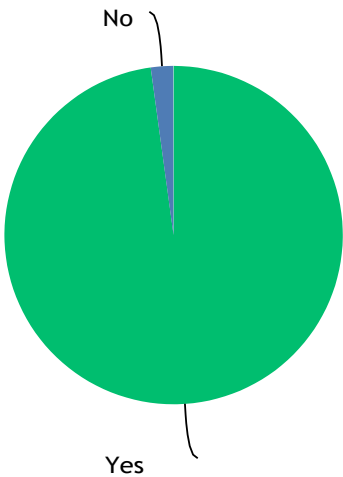


Q1 Are you a Burlington, CT resident?

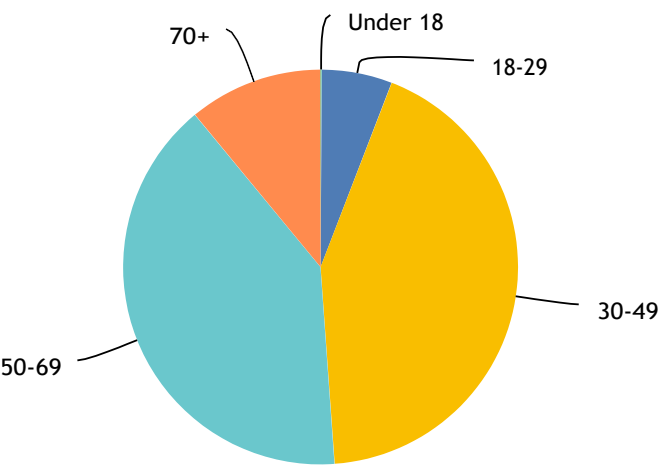

Q2 Age group of person(s) completing this survey?

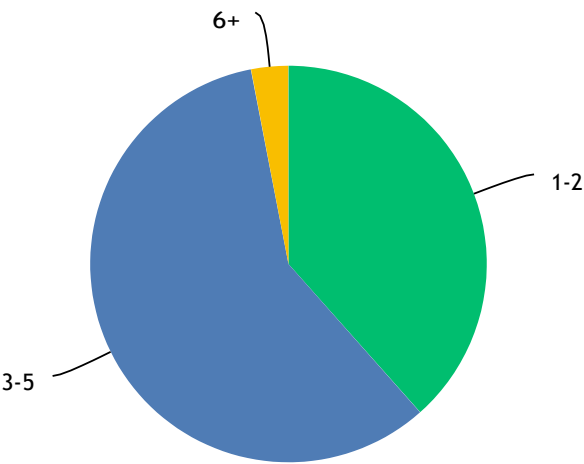

Q3 How many people live in your household?

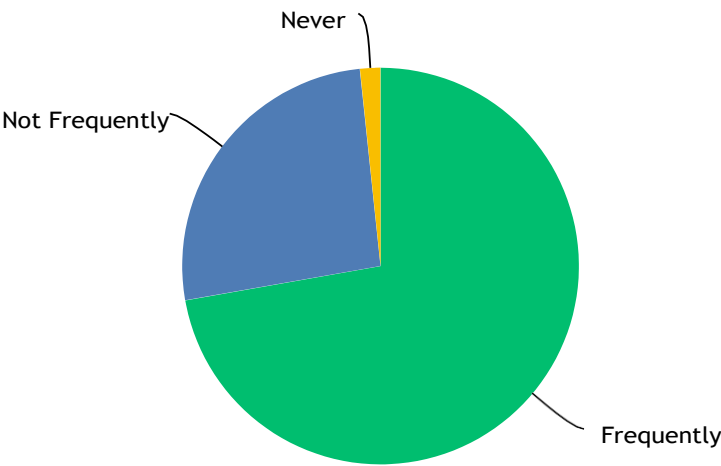

Q4 How often do you visit the town center?

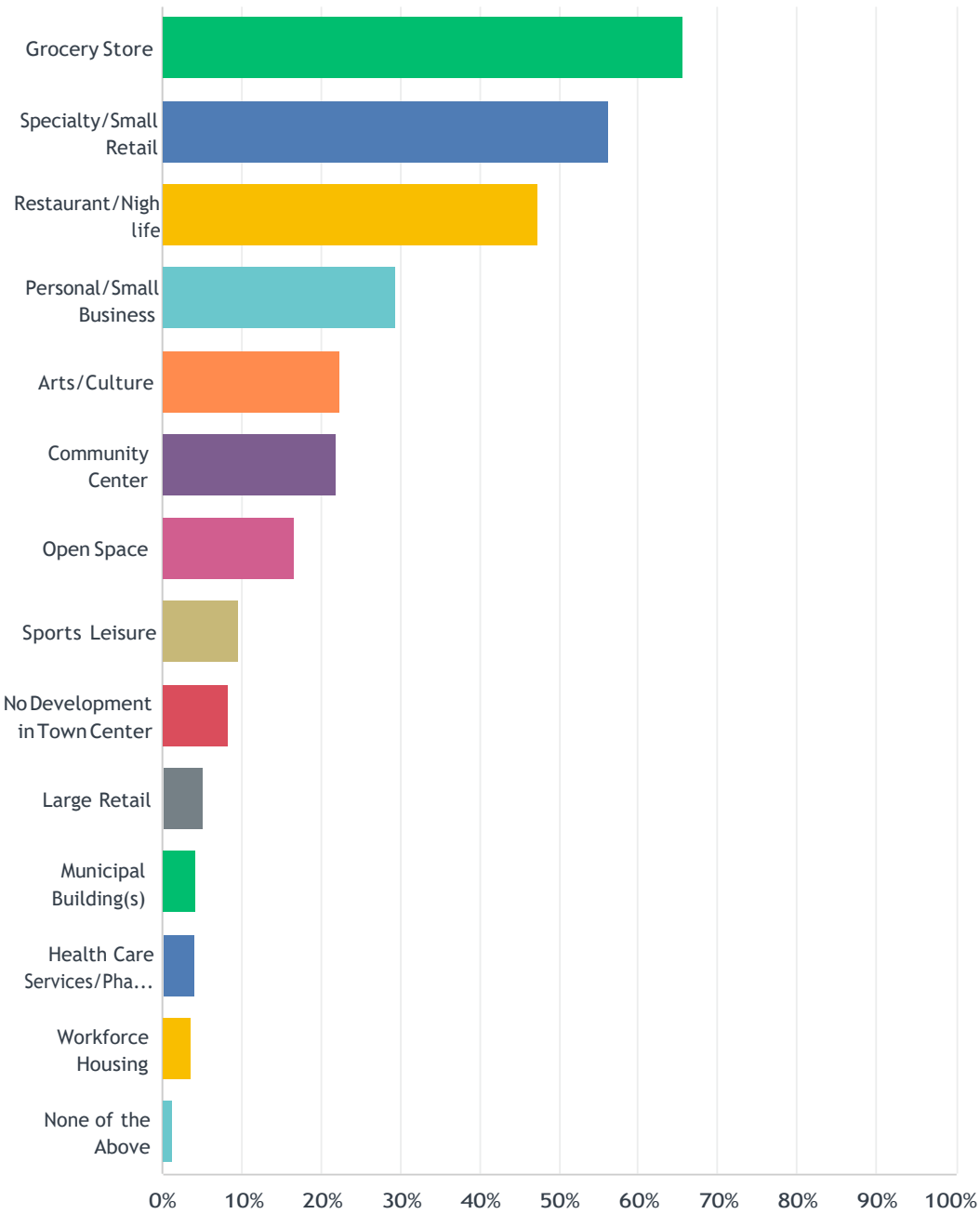

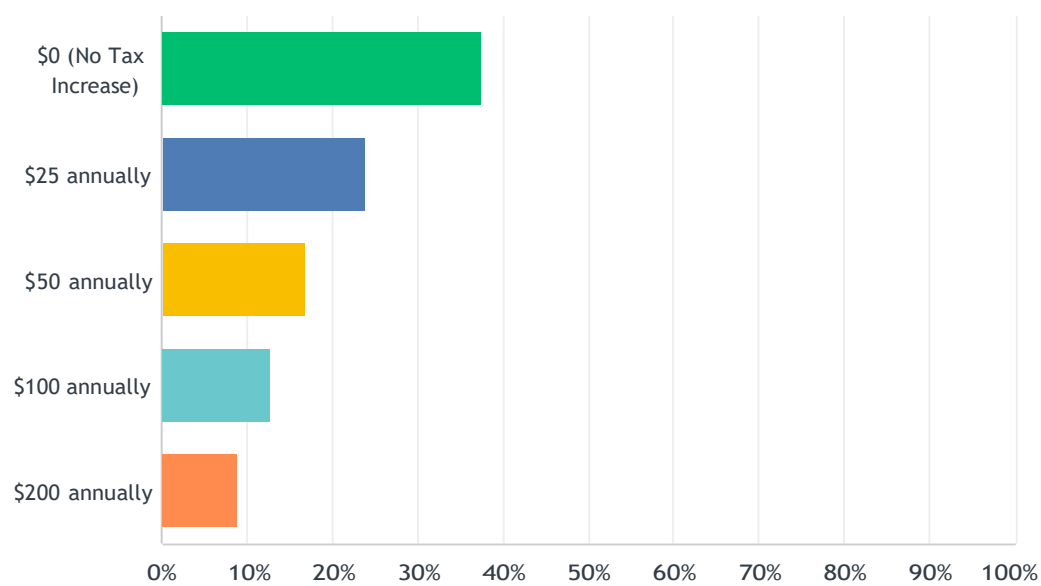

Need to complete phase II of sidewalks/streetscape on Route 4 between Library Lane and Route 69 intersection. CT DOT has awarded Burlington significant grant dollars towards the project and Mr. Patel agreed to contribute a certain amount in his PZC approval.

Time after time I have been told that the town could not support a grocery store, I disagree and feel that a grocery store would support smaller retail stores that have been able to survive without an anchor we do not need another package store or pizza place

I'd like to see a technology educational facility built.

Small grocery store is pretty necessary Please ensure you address traffic and possibly an alternate entrance that doesn't dump onto Rt4. Suggest also that anything built be developed with our quaint town's design aesthetic in mind.

Try to add new businesses that will add value, not simply double up on businesses we already have; otherwise, you are just forcing competition and not expanding our shopping variety. This will only force residents to travel elsewhere to shop; this in turn will mean residents will still do the majority of the spending in surrounding towns that offer more options. Also, preserve the look of a New England town to keep property values up.

When approving new business, be mindful to include zoning that requires it fit with the needs of the residents, structures preserve charm and character of the town. The development should enhance the property value of residents not diminish it. Think Collinsville or Simsbury. We don't need businesses that draw in crowds that will then interfere with commuter traffic, and quality of life for those of us who actually live here: residents.

A small coffee shop serving breakfast sandwiches and drawing in commuters would be awesome. Not a huge grocery store but like a highland park market!

That development is carefully done to keep the "feel" of Burlington. Do not want to see large chain retailer or lots of neon lighting. A walkable town center would be awesome! Outdoor dining?
